
Book Title: Are You My Mother?

Hay	To represent the bird nest with Mother bird and the egg on page 1. when the baby bird returns home.	Motor: Student can reach for/feel the hay, noting its attributes and textures. Academic: Student can sequence tactile materials to represent the sequence of events in the story. Auditory: Student can listen to the sound the hay makes when crunched.
Tactile down arrow	When the baby bird looks down for his mother. When the baby bird falls.	Motor: Student can trace the arrow with his/her fingers/hand. Student can imitate a downward motion. Academic: Student can sequence tactile materials to represent the sequence of events in the story. Visual: Student can view the arrow on a contrasting background.
Tactile up arrow	When the baby bird looks up for his mother. When the "snort" picks up the baby bird.	Motor: Student can trace the arrow with his/her fingers/hand. Student can imitate a downward motion. Academic: Student can sequence tactile materials to represent the sequence of events in the story. Visual: Student can view the arrow on a contrasting background.
Faux Fur	When the baby bird meets the kitten When the baby bird meets the dog.	Motor: Student can reach for/feel the faux fur, noting it's attributes. Academic: Student can sequence tactile materials to represent the sequence of events in the story.
Feather	When the baby bird meets a hen.	Motor: Student can reach for/feel the feather, noting it's attributes. Academic: Student can sequence tactile materials to represent the sequence of events in the story.
Cow patterned material	When the baby bird meets the cow.	Motor: Student can reach for/feel the cow material. Academic: Student can sequence tactile materials to rhayepresent the sequence of events in the story.

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
