 circle Coyote, and take back their feathers.

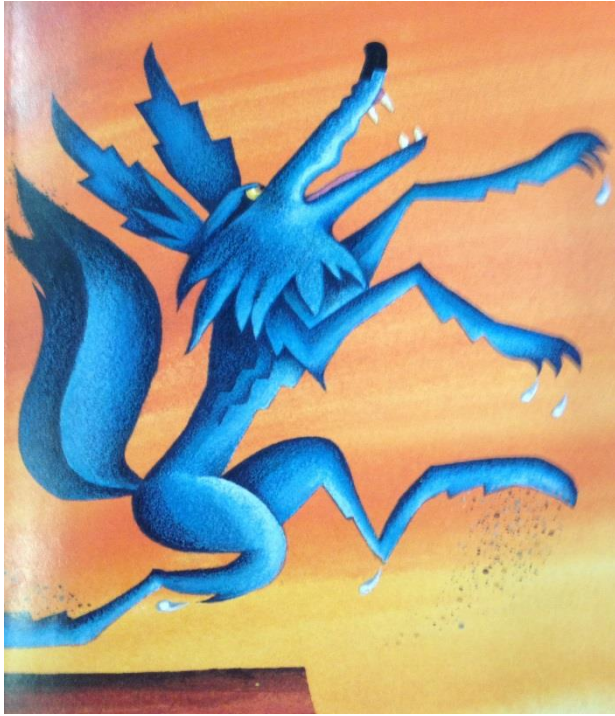

 Coyote  runs  after  the crows.




 Coyote  trips  and  falls,  tumbling  in the  dirt.
